

QUIS CAMOTE, HONDURAS

Deep in the mountains of Honduras, where abundant coffee plantations grow on sides of mountains, the small village of Quis Camote is home to 127 indigenous Indians. A one room school serves as the education center for 66 students of all ages. Their teacher walks up the mountain each day to teach in this sparse room with no electricity. Students in uniforms, but no shoes, attend school each day with little supplies and little food. The men work the coffee plantations for 4 months a year, as mothers and grandmothers work the small gardens in the village and tend to the children.



The homes are small shacks with dirt floors, no electricity and until recently no running water. October 2006, we made our first trip to this under developed part of Honduras. The six hour ride from San Pedro Sula loaded with powdered milk for the children was like an episode of National Geographic.



The scenery was amazing and the reception from the residents of this forgotten village was without a doubt worth the long rigorous ride up the mountain. Since then we have made two more incredible trips to our friends in Quis Camote bringing them clothing and much needed food, rice, beans and flour.

After the first visit, a team built a water retention system with piping to run water to each house.
